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
## WELCOME FROM THE PRESIDENT

# Introduction

## **MISSION**

Westminster Theological College & Seminary Cambodia (WTCS) seeks to glorify God by training pastors and other leaders to serve Christ's Church and expand His kingdom in Cambodia, Asia, and all over the world.

WTCS exists to teach and train those whom God has called to be pastors, preachers, church planters, evangelists, Bible teachers, and biblical counselors.

WTCS aims to equip them with biblical, theological, and ministerial disciplines in the Reformed tradition, and healthy self-discipline, so that they can have the passion for the gospel of grace and the zeal for building God-centered, Bible-soaked, Gospel-driven, and Christ-exalting churches.



## HISTORY

- May, 2011 Westminster Theological College & Seminary (WTCS) was organized under the Westminster Education Institute (WEI), NGO.
- August 26, 2011 WTCS started to operate three schools; The Pastoral Education (PE), College, and Seminary, under the first president Rev. J. Hwangbo's leadership.
- December, 2011 The board of WEI was formed in CA, USA, and Rev. Bryan H. Kim was elected as the chairman of the Board.
- February, 2014 WTCS purchased 1.5 hectares of land in village Snou Kiet, Sankat Snou, Khan Porsenchey, Phnom Penh for the new campus site.
- January 26, 2015 The WEI Board of trustees was renamed the Westminster World Mission Foundation (WWMF) at its annual meeting in LA, and elected Rev. Kyusong Pak as the Chairman of the Board.
- June, 2015 The new Presbytery of Cambodia Presbyterian Church (CPC) was organized, consisting of Westminster Presbyterian Church and seven other local churches.
- June, 2015 WTCS launched Summer English Academy (SEA), an annual ESL program.
- August, 2015 WTCS started ThM degree program from fall semester.

- January 26, 2016 The Board of Trustees of WWMF elected Rev. David Kwon as the Chairman of the Board, and appointed Rev. Dr. David Yuhan as president and Rev. Dr. Sang Park as Academic Dean of WTCS.
- April 20, 2016 WTCS held Ground Breaking Service at the new campus site.
- April 26, 2017 WTCS held New Campus Dedication Service.  
The Board of Trustees of WWMF elected Rev. Kilho Lee as the Chairman of the Board.
- January 27, 2020 The Board of Trustees elected Rev. Hae Keun Choi as the Chairman of the Board.
- February, 24, 2020 WTCS appointed Rev. Robert II Kwon as Academic Dean at the Faculty Meeting.
- September 28, 2020 The 9th Commencement was held with 8 graduates: 3 ThM, 2 MDiv, 2 MA, 1 BA.  
The total number of graduates as of Sept. 28, 2020 is 109: 3 ThM, 23 MDiv, 19 MA, 23 BA, and 41 from PE.
- Current enrollment**  
(As of 2019) 10 in college, 5 in Master of Arts, 6 in MDiv, 5 in ThM, and 30 in PE; comprised of students from Cambodia, China, India, Korea, Laos, Myanmar, Nepal, the Philippines, and Vietnam.

## **DOCTRINAL COMMITMENT**

We trust that the Bible is the supreme authority in all matters of faith and life.

We believe that the meaning of Scripture must be learned by comparing Scripture with Scripture and through the faithful and accurate interpretation of each text and not by appeals to human tradition or private revelations.

Our faculty affirms the inspiration, sufficiency, and inerrancy of the Old and New Testaments.

Our faculty subscribes to the Westminster Confession of Faith, one of the great confessions of the Reformation, as a very accurate and faithful summary of what the Bible teaches.

The Confession teaches among many other truths, the “Five Alones” of the Reformation: Scripture Alone, Christ Alone, Grace Alone, Faith Alone, and to God Alone be the Glory.

## **NON-DISCRIMINATION POLICY**

WTCS does not discriminate on the basis of race, age, color, national or ethnic origin, or gender in the administration of its admissions policies, services, or scholarship programs.

The school understands the criteria for the gospel ministry set down in Scripture as limiting candidacy for the gospel ministry to qualified males. Because the Master of Divinity program is designed to prepare candidates for official pastoral ministry, only men are admitted to the MDiv degree program. For the same reason, Pastoral Education program is also limited to male pastoral leaders in local churches.

Women as well as men receive gifts and callings from God to serve in various non-ordained ministries. Therefore, women and men are encouraged to enroll in the Master of Arts program.

## **CAMPUS**

The beautiful campus is located on the outskirts of Phnom Penh, the capital city of Cambodia. The neighborhood is safe, clean, and quiet. We offer comfortable self-contained dormitories, good food at a separate dining hall, a fine library, a student lounge, and a table tennis room. On the campus are a spacious sports field, a small fish pond, and a garden pond with an Island at the center called Patmos. The school has an ideal quiet setting for study.

Master of Divinity (MDiv) program is designed to prepare church leaders to become ordained pastors, associate pastors, church planters, evangelists, and missionaries. They are to believe and love the Word of God, and they shall strive to make disciples of all nations, baptizing them and teaching them to observe what the LORD has commanded.

This program equips the future church leaders to understand and interpret the Scriptures in order to properly handle and preach the Word and to build up Christ's church. Each book of the Bible in the curriculum is studied and some books in greater depth. It also entails significant study of Greek, Hebrew, systematic theology, historical theology, practical theology and preaching,

The degree is conferred upon the completion of the prescribed program, which requires three years of full-time study or longer of part-time study. The sequence of courses to be taken could vary depending on the initial semester of the year the student takes.

Additional Requirements: Bible Contents Examination

This program is designed for men and women to gain the knowledge and skills needed to apply biblical truth to the intellectual issues confronting the church and the surrounding culture, and to develop the knowledge and skills in interpreting the Word of God and to improve the ability to analyze contemporary trends by biblical interpretation with discernment.

The degree is conferred upon the completion of the prescribed program, which requires two years of full-time study or longer of part-time study. The sequence of courses to be taken may vary depending on the initial semester of the year the student takes.



## Master of Theology (ThM) Program

This program aims to expand the student's knowledge of a major field of theology through training and practice in the use of the methods and tools of theological research, and thus to be better equipped for his pastoral ministry, for his/ her teaching ministry or more advanced graduate study.

The degree is offered in two fields: Biblical Studies with majors in the Old Testament or the New Testament; and Theological Studies with majors in Church History, Systematic Theology, or Apologetics.

Each candidate must select a major area of concentration within his or her chosen field. Each candidate is assigned an academic advisor by ThM committee after completion of eight courses including Greek 3 and Hebrew 3.

The degree is conferred upon the completion of the following requirements: knowledge of the original languages of Scripture upon initial matriculation, completion of six courses from 900s (at least one or more courses must be in the candidate's major area of concentration), submission of a master's thesis on an approved subject within the candidate's major area of concentration, and being sustained on a comprehensive oral examination of the candidate's major area of concentration before committee.

The minimum length of time to complete this program is one academic year of full-time study and one additional year to complete the thesis and take a comprehensive examination. It is permissible for the student to complete the degree within three years depending on the pace of study.

Additional Requirement: Bible Contents Exam

This is a 126 credit-unit undergraduate program designed for lay people who desire a biblical and theological training with an exposure to the original languages. Through the curriculum each student in the program gains a sufficient knowledge of the Scriptures and Reformed teaching by completing the program. The student is thus equipped to bring an informed Christian perspective to a variety of callings and non-ordained ministries.

The degree is conferred upon the completion of the prescribed program, which requires four years of full-time study or longer years of part-time. The sequence of the courses to be taken may vary depending on the initial semester the student takes.

## Non-Degree Programs

### Pastoral Education

This program is designed to make pastoral leaders prepared for gospel-driven ministry, leadership in local churches and Christ-centered communities through an intensive week-long program which is offered three times a year for three years. All classes are conducted in or interpreted Khmer.

Its core curriculum includes the training with a strong emphasis on theological studies in Reformed tradition, with the key courses for pastoral leadership, practice, oversight and biblical government in the church, and essential biblical studies for preaching.

This program is limited to male pastoral leaders in local churches and requires each student to complete the courses by earning 76 units for four years. Upon completion, he receives the diploma from WTCS. The sequence of the courses to be taken depends on the initial session he takes and how the school arranges for each session.

The one who has completed the program with a diploma is eligible to apply for admission to the BA in theology program of WTCS as a third-year student.

### Attendance Requirements

It is required of the student to attend all three sessions (Spring session in February, Summer session in June, and Fall session in August) for three years. Any student who takes a self-

appointed break from any of the sessions will be dismissed from the program.

## Course Requirements:

The student is to complete the required course works in three years. Any who is unable to complete the required course works for graduation in three years, is allowed to attend additional sessions. For such students WTCS provides the scholarship for room and board but no travel voucher.

## English Language Program (ELP)

ELP is a comprehensive and rigorous ESL program designed to enable students to learn all four skills: reading, writing, speaking, and listening. It is made up of two courses:

- Summer English Academy (SEA) in the summertime, and
- Preparatory English Language Training (PELT) during the regular semester

### Summer English Academy (SEA)

SEA is an intensive four-week ESL course, and it is open to anyone in Cambodia who graduated from high school. Those who have completed the course successfully are eligible to apply for the admission to Westminster College (BA degree program).

### Preparatory English Language Training (PELT)

PELT is a rigorous ESL course during the regular semester for WTCS students who need to improve their English Language proficiency so that they may properly follow the regular classes conducted in English. This is 3 + 3 month program, ongoing 6 months of English study with no break.

All students will be evaluated at the end of the semester. When considered necessary, any of them may be evaluated individually. Those who have passed the evaluation are to attend regular classes at WTCS, and those who have failed are to be dismissed from the ELP, and thus from WTCS.



# Course Descriptions



## BIBLICAL STUDIES

### OLD TESTAMENT

#### OT400 Hebrew 1 (2)

Study of basic grammar and vocabulary

#### OT401 Hebrew 2 (2)

Continuation of grammar and vocabulary study

#### OT403 OT Survey (2)

An overview of the content of the Scriptures in the Old Testament. This course will provide the student with the knowledge of the chronology of redemptive history, the structure, and contents of the OT writings.

#### OT404 Christ in OT (2)

This course presents the big picture of the Scripture and how each part of Scripture contributes to the big picture, focusing upon Jesus Christ in whom the entire Scripture finds its unity.

#### OT500 Biblical Theology (2)

An analysis of God's revelation in the Bible that focuses on its progressive unfolding throughout redemptive history as seen in God's covenantal administration

#### OT501 Pentateuch (3)

A biblical-theological analysis of God's covenantal administration of the kingdom during the period covered by the Pentateuch. Study of the emergence and formation of the Old Testament canon

#### OT601 Historical Books (2)

Special introduction to the historical books of the Old Testament and to the historical, literary, and theological character of Hebrew narrative

#### OT701 Psalms and Wisdom Books (2)

An introduction to the poetical and wisdom books of the Old Testament and to the nature of Hebrew poetry, genre and contextual analysis of the Psalms, exegesis of selected passages, and development of a biblical-theological approach to this literature

#### OT702 Prophetic Books (2)

The nature and history of the prophetic institution in Israel. Introduction and exegesis of selected passages, with special attention to the messianic theme and eschatological patterns

## NEW TESTAMENT

### NT400 Greek 1 (2)

Intensive instruction in New Testament Greek with emphasis upon morphology and vocabulary

### NT401 Greek 2 (2)

This course introduces intermediate syntax and build vocabulary, while reviewing the morphology learned in Greek 1.

### NT501 NT Survey (2)

An introductory overview of NT. The student will be able to understand the overarching message, the structure, and content of NT.

### NT503 New Testament Interpretation (2)

General introduction and hermeneutics, including historical, cultural, and religious background; the language and translation of the New Testament; textual criticism; development of expertise in the principles and practice of New Testament exegesis.

### NT601 Gospels and Acts (2)

A critical survey of the history of the criticism of the Gospels; questions of special introduction; the life and ministry of Jesus; the particular

theological perspective of each Gospel; survey of the Jesus' teaching on the Kingdom of God; the origin and expansion of the New Testament church in the book of Acts and the theology of Luke-Acts; all leading to developing expertise in the interpretation of the Gospels and Acts.

### NT602 Pauline Epistles (2)

Questions of special introduction centering on Paul and his writings; the theology of Paul, current issues in Pauline scholarship, and Paul's unique contribution to the revelation of God's redemption plan through example exegesis of Pauline texts.

### NT603 General Epistles (2)

Question of special introduction; exegesis of selected passages with a view to establishing the structure and distinctive themes of these books

### NT701 Revelation (2)

Hermeneutical issues and strategies for the Book of Revelation. Survey of the vision, their interrelationship, and their significance in light of the Old Testament background, Christ's redemptive achievement, and the crisis confronting the churches

## CHURCH HISTORY

### CH601 The Ancient Church (2)

A study of the developing theology, ecclesiology, piety, and worship of the Christian church from the close of the apostolic age to 600 A.D.

### CH602 The Medieval Church and the Reformation (2)

A survey of church history from 600 A.D. to 1600 A.D. The first half of the course is on medieval developments; doctrinal controversies, the growth of papal power, monasticism, scholasticism, mysticism, and forerunners of the Reformation. The other half is on the Reformation, examining its impact on theology, worship, and piety as well as its general effect on society.

### CH701 The Church in the Modern Age (2)

A study of prominent movements in the church from 1600 A.D. to the present. The course will focus on the consolidation of Protestant orthodoxy, the challenge of pietism and rationalism, the evangelical revival, and the impact of the industrial revolution and liberalism.

## SYSTEMATIC THEOLOGY

### ST401 Westminster Confession of Faith (3)

A Survey of the theology, piety, and worship of the Westminster Standards.

### ST502 Doctrine of Scripture (2)

An overview of doctrine of Scripture including inspiration, inerrancy, special and general revelation, as well as an overview of the major historic theological frameworks and their approach to Scripture

### ST602 Doctrine of God (2)

The doctrine of God's existence in unity and Trinity, His attributes, works, decrees and providence.

### ST603 Doctrine of Man (2)

Origin, nature, and original state of man, image of God, covenant of works, the fall, the doctrine of sin, free agency.

### ST604 Doctrine of Christ (2)

Plan of salvation, sovereign election, covenant of grace, person and offices of Christ, the source, necessity, nature, and extent of the atonement.

ST701 Doctrine of the Holy Spirit (2)

Common grace; the *ordo salutis*; union with Christ; calling; regeneration; faith and repentance; assurance of salvation; justification; adoption; sanctification; perseverance; Baptism and the Lord's Supper; the coming of Christ and the end of the age.

ST702 The Christian Life (2)

Ethics as application of Scripture to all of life; survey of non-Christian approaches to ethics; the general structure of Christian ethics; revelation of divine law to present circumstances and inward dispositions; applications of biblical principles to contemporary issues; following the order of the decalogue.

ST703 Doctrine of Church (2)

Biblical-theological and systematic-theological study of the church with attention to ecclesiological issues in the history of the church and the contemporary situation; the church as the people of God, community of Christ, and the fellowship of the Spirit

## PRACTICAL THEOLOGY

PT500 Ministry of the Word (3)

Biblical theology of pastoral ministry as the ministry of the Word of God, with a focus on preaching in the context of the church's public worship, theology of worship and leadership in worship

PT504 Advanced Preaching (2)

Instruction and practice in the method of sermon preparation; prayer, biblical exegesis, structure and outlining, illustration, application, and delivery.

PT505 Redemptive Preaching (2)

Christ-centered preaching that relates texts to their context in the history of redemption.

PT511 Ministry of Witness (2)

An introduction to the theology and practice of the communication of the gospel to unconverted persons; both within our own cultural contexts and among diverse people groups—ethnic, linguistic, economic, etc



PT600 Ministry of Discipleship  
(2)

Biblical theology of the spiritual nurture of God's covenant people, leading to their growing maturity in faith and life

PT603 Directory of Worship (2)

A study of theology of true worship; elements of worship; fundamental and controversial issues pertaining to the church's corporate worship; historical and contemporary liturgical practices in the light of biblical principles and the Reformed tradition

PT604 Church Administration and Polity (2)

Attributes of the church; marks of a true church; biblical worship; ecclesiastical office and government; the relationship of the church to the kingdom of God to its cultural context

PT605 Biblical Marriage (2)

Biblical foundation and understanding of marriage and family, biblical manhood and womanhood, roles and duties, communication, sex, and issues of divorce and remarriage.

PT610 Biblical Counseling (2)

A brief history of Biblical Counseling movement, and an introduction to the theory and methodology of biblical counseling

PT630 Pastoral Leadership (2)

The pastor's heart and life; the preacher's growth in grace and gifts for ministry

## FIELD EDUCATION

FE701 Pastoral Internship (3)

Six hundred (600) hours of supervised and evaluated ministry in a local congregation

# WELCOME TO WESTMINSTER CAMBODIA (WTCS)

## Campus Visit

Visiting our campus is one of the best ways for prospective students to get acquainted with WTCS. The best days to visit are Tuesday through Friday during the academic year. While visiting, you may get the opportunity to observe the classes, meet many of our students, attend our daily chapel with the students and eat our school lunch after the chapel. ## Admissions Procedure

WTCS welcomes students from all denominations and backgrounds, and qualified students are admitted without regard to age, sex, color, race, nationality, or ethnic origin.

To be considered for the admission, complete the following documents and forms, and submit them to WTCS via email ([info@WestminsterCambodia.org](mailto:info@WestminsterCambodia.org)).

1. WTCS Application for Admission with a photograph attached: The form is available at the campus or you may download it at [www.westminstercambodia.org](http://www.westminstercambodia.org).
2. Two Personal Statements
  - a. Personal Statement 1: An essay about your spiritual experience, including your conversion, vision, calling, and the reason why you have chosen to pursue your study at WTCS (250-500 words).
  - b. Personal Statement 2: An essay about your gifts for ministry, and your professional and vocational goals (250-500 words).
3. Official Transcripts
  - a. The college applicant: The Transcripts of High School you graduated from.
  - b. The seminary applicant: College Transcripts. If you attended more than one college, include the transcripts from each college.
4. Two References using the Forms
  - a. Pastoral/ Ecclesiastical Reference: This is to evaluate the applicant's spiritual fitness, and this should be completed by a pastor or an elder from the church of which the applicant is a member in good standing.
  - b. Academic/ Professional Reference: This is to evaluate the applicant's academic ability and the likelihood that

the applicant might successfully meet WTCS's academic requirements. For a seminary applicant, it should be completed by a professor at the college under whom the applicant completed his/ her coursework.

Once the applicant's complete application package has been received and reviewed, WTCS will notify the applicant of the final decision regarding the admission.

Since all classes in WTCS, with the exception of the Pastoral Education, are conducted in English, the applicant should take an English Test for the evaluation of language proficiency, and also have an interview in English with the Academic Dean of the school.

When the applicant meets all other requirements but his English proficiency, the student will get admission on probation and be put on the PELT course in English Language Program (See the *Catalogue* pp. 34-35).

Applications for admission to WTCS are accepted year-round, and the accepted student does not have to wait for the next semester or next academic year.

However, it is recommended that the completed application be submitted well in advance of the beginning date of each semester so as to keep up with the class schedules which are offered at particular times only.

## Transfer Student and Credits

A transfer student is someone who has completed a body of academic work (ordinarily a semester or more) at another institution, college or graduate level seminary, and is seeking to study at WTCS.

A student who would like to transfer from another institution should apply for admission in the usual way --- submitting the application, required admission documents and complete transcripts of the prior college or seminary work. The student is responsible to present the course descriptions of these possible transfer courses from the catalogue of the previous institution.

1. The Academic Dean (or school authority) will review the academic standards of the institution and the qualifications of the course instructors along with the academic standards of the particular course(s) to make a preliminary list of possible transfer-for-credit courses, and finally will present the list before the WTCS faculty.
2. In order for a course to be eligible for transfer from another institution, it must be comparable or equivalent (in content and in course assignments) to a course in the WTCS curriculum and it must apply to the particular WTCS academic program and degree requirements in which the student is enrolling (BA in Theology, MA and MDiv). Undergraduate courses cannot be transferred as graduate courses. Credits are not given for "life" or ministry experience.

3. Credits for work completed at other institutions may be granted after evaluation by WTCS. Only those courses in which the student has earned a grade of C and above are transferrable. A grade of C- or below is not transferable. All courses are transferred at the rate of two (2) credit hours per course when the corresponding courses of WTCS are two (2) credit semester hour courses.
4. WTCS grade point averages will be determined only by work completed at WTCS. Transfer courses will be recorded in the WTCS student transcript with a grade of "T" and will not be counted in the WTCS GPA. The transferring student will have a permanent record of his/her GPA from the prior institution in the transcript from that institution.
5. Transfer students must complete at least one-half (50%) of the hours required for any WTCS degree program at WTCS. Transfer students may be required to take more than the minimum requirements for graduation because the courses taken elsewhere may not be equivalent to those in the WTCS curriculum and thus may not be transferrable.

## International Students

Prospective international students are urged to start the application process at least six months prior to the semester at which they wish to start their study. In order for the applicant to obtain the visa for student (E-S) to Cambodia, he/ she must have final approval letter of admission as a full-time student, and must also supply certification that he/ she

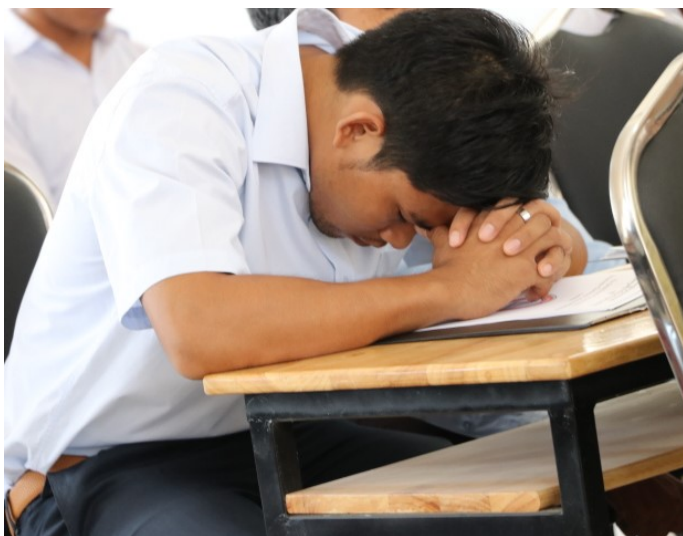
has financial resources adequate to provide for his/ her expenses while studying in Cambodia.

Please note that the regulations regarding the issuing of the student visa may change at any time. It is the student's responsibility to get necessary information through the local Cambodian Embassy/ Consulate or visit the appropriate website for forms and policies regarding the entrance to Cambodia as a student.

Students who come to study at WTCS must register and maintain a full-time status of 12 or more units per semester for the graduate program and 16 or more units per semester for the undergraduate program.







# Financial Information

## Cost of Your Education

The cost of higher education is overwhelming, and the tuition is only a part of it. Other expenses include meals, housing, books, school supplies, personal expenses, medical expenses, etc. The following shows the estimated cost based on the average expenses in US dollars incurred by students at Westminster Cambodia. It is subject to change each academic year.

In principle, the student has the primary responsibility for financing his/ her education and is supposed to do whatever is possible to meet financial needs. However, Westminster Cambodia tries to provide financial assistance to those students who, without financial aids, would be unable to pursue their education.

WTCS offers a housing for married couples near the school campus from the spring semester in 2021. It is located about

one kilometer away from the school. The housing is for married couples with no children, and the couple get the highest priority if both are students. The couples have separate bedroom but are to share a communal kitchen with other couples, and there will be a flat fee for basic utilities.

## Personal Expenses

Personal expenses mean any money that the student spends personally while studying on campus. The expenses include the costs for transportation to and from the school, personal textbooks and supplies for study, daily personal necessities, entertainments, snacks, etc. International students should secure budget for the expenses to maintain their legal status in Cambodia. The student is responsible for all his/ her personal expenses and the amount may go up or down, depending on the student's situation, budget, and affordability.

## Medical Expenses

WTCS tries to provide the best environment for each student to be able to study with no major obstruction. When an injury or illness occurs to a student while studying at WTCS, the school will provide an immediate and urgent care through local medical facilities. If the impact of the injury or illness requires constant care, the school will send the student back home for an appropriate care. When the student is well and ready, he/ she may return anytime to resume and complete the study.

## Scholarships and Financial Aids

Recipients of any financial aid award from WTCS must be admitted to or enrolled in either ELP or a degree program of the school as full-time.

WTCS has scholarships and financial aids in several categories for students as follow:

- Westminster Scholarship
- Merit-based Scholarships
- Church, Missionary, or Individual Grants

## Westminster Scholarship

WTCS offers all enrolled students Westminster Scholarship and the total amount of the Scholarship is \$900 per semester and \$1800 per academic year. When the new semester starts, every student is to pay his/ her share of \$300 out of \$1200, the remaining balance. This is equally applied to all students living on- or off- campus.

Westminster Scholarship is a combination of Grant and Work-Study Program. You receive the benefit of scholarship for your study out of grace and you express your gratitude with your joyful service of six hours per week for school when called upon. The school will arrange the job and the work schedule for those living on-campus. And those living off-campus are advised to meet with the Administrator (or school authority) to adjust their jobs and work schedules according to individual's talent and circumstance.

For any student who happens to be unable to afford his/ her share of \$300 payment for the semester, the school will

arrange additional Grant sponsored by churches or missionaries but it is not guaranteed.

## Merit-based Scholarships

The school awards merit-based scholarships to students who meet certain criteria. Such criteria include, but are not limited to, high academic standing, proven record of leadership ability, and potential leadership in the church of Christ. The financial need of the students may be considered. This is normally given for one year, but may be lengthened based on the student's performance.

## Grants sponsored by Churches, Missionaries, or Individuals

These grants are funded by churches, missionaries, or individuals who support Westminster Cambodia. The amount and manner of the disbursement of each grant vary depending on the sponsor. If the grant is sponsored by a church or a missionary, the recipient is to be expected to do ministries assigned by the church or the missionary over weekends and or during the vacation.

## Regulation for Monetary Penalty

This is applied for the students who have been admitted on probation. In case the statement you made in your application form about your desire to study theology at WTCS proves untrue while you are on PELT course in ELP, you will be charged with penalty money. The amount will be determined on

the basis of the total sum of the tuition and fees, meals and housing, books and supplies, and other expenses.



# Student Life

## Library

Though the library is relatively small in size, it houses over 6000 volumes of books (hard copies and electronic books), CDs, DVDs, essential reference books and many indispensable books for theological study, donated from the personal libraries of numerous retired reformed pastors and other individuals. Many more books are still arriving, making it more resourceful.

The library is furnished with a number of desktops for the students who do not own their personal computers. WiFi is available in the library, enabling the students to have online access to their research resources.

The policies for the library use are found in the Student Handbook.



## Devotional life

The spiritual life of the students is nurtured by the chapel in the middle of the busy study schedule, from Tuesday to Friday, under the oversight of the faculty. The daily chapel of half an hour strengthens the students, providing them with comfort, wisdom, strength, and challenges them through messages



delivered by faculty members along with prayers and songs of praise.

Students who live on campus have regular meetings for informal devotionals, one early in the morning and another in the evening, through which they share burdens and blessings in their lives, admonishing and encouraging one another.



## Church Life

WTCS recognizes the role of the church for the growth of every Christian. Every Friday many students leave the campus and head for local churches for their ministry practice or internship over the weekend.

The students who stay at campus join the Lord's Day worship services every Sunday at Cambodian Reformed Presbyterian Church (CRPC: Pastor P. Ny) located near the WTCS campus. Those who do not speak Khmer should join the Lord's Day service in English at Westminster Presbyterian Church (WPC: Pastor S. Sous) located near the school campus. WTCS students serve both CRPC and WPC in every area of the

church ministry such as choir, children's ministry, greeting and offering ushers, praise and worship team, etc.

WTCS students have their opportunities to apply for the ministry internship in CRPC or WPC. The ministry interns are mentored and trained for their future ministry in preaching, teaching adult Bible study and leading children's ministry, under the supervision of the senior pastors of the both churches.

## Ministry Experience

The Field Education program of WTCS is designed to integrate on-campus studies with part-time ministry in local churches; Ministry Internship and Ministry Practice.

It is required of each student on Master of Divinity program at WTCS to fulfill 600 hours of Internship at a local church which will take two semesters to complete (6 units). It is an opportunity for the MDiv student to obtain practical ministry experience to which they can apply the information they learned in the classroom. WTCS seeks to balance in its curriculum the intense Christian scholarship with practical ministry.

Not only the students on Master of Arts program but also the upper level students on college program are recommended to participate in the Field Education program although not required.

## Dormitory Life

All students in college are expected to study as full-time and to live on-campus, while it is optional for students on the master's program, either to be part-time or full-time and to live on-campus or off-campus.

WTCS community is very distinctive and thus the life in the dormitory is truly unique. It surely is a hard-knock academic community sharpening any and every student in many ways, especially theologically, for between two and seven years depending on your plan. It could be your theological turning point in your life in faith.

It is at the same time a closely-knit sociological community, where you learn all about biblical relationships for 24 hours—7 days—12 months. It is rather a family to live with no covering, exposing one another literally everything: one's own character that is hard-to-get-along with, one's personal habit no one else ever understands, the shame that you never volunteer to tell anyone, yet loving and being loved. A big family, sharing in life the precious blood shed on the Cross, "being naked but not ashamed!"

Through the daily hard work of study, sports activities, cleaning jobs or strenuous yard work sometimes in school, you love and hate, you sin and are forgiven, and you also are sinned against and forgive. Through it all you will meet the LORD again and again, face to face, confirming a redemptive community with your brothers and sisters in Christ, and finding yourself limping as Jacob was after his

Peniel incident! You will never be the same person after the life at WTCS.

The living quarters for female and male students are separated from each other, and no one is allowed to visit the living quarters of the opposite sex.

It is recommended for everyone to make sure to follow the various regulations and policies about locker, permit for leaving the campus for any reasons, and the schedules for cleaning, laundry, etc. There is also a resident assistant for additional guidance and help in the dormitory.



# Conduct

WTCS is a distinctively Christian community and expects its students (and all on campus including visitors) to conform to the standards of behavior set forth in Scripture and in the historical Reformed confessions.

These standards teach that authentic goodness is a state of the heart, the product of regeneration by God's Holy Spirit. We cannot judge others' heart; therefore, we cannot judge the internal thoughts and attitudes which produce good or wicked actions. But we can and must take account of the external actions which Scripture praises or condemns. Those whose actions violate these biblical and confessional standards may be subject to discipline, and, in case of serious unrepentant or continued violation, may be required to leave the institution.

Some offenses which are subject to discipline, with the possibility of expulsion, include (but are not limited to) the following:

...participation in any occult, profane or blasphemous language, expressions of disrespect for others, contentiousness, divisiveness, slander, physical assault, unbiblical termination of pregnancy, substance abuse, sexual misconduct (including rape, incest, fornication, adultery, prurient use of pornography, lewd conduct, homosexual behavior), unrepentant divorce which was obtained on unbiblical grounds, lying, cheating, dishonesty,

disruptive behavior, theft, and damage to the property of others.

WTCS is committed to being an institution free of the use of illegal drugs and of the abuse of alcohol. Illegal drugs may not be used at or brought to the campus or any school activity. Alcohol may not be consumed on campus or at a school function.

God's Word commands respect for others and the maintenance of sexual purity in thought, word, and deed. Scripture condemns the use of influence by persons of either sex to exploit others sexually, and it instructs Christ's followers to avoid all sorts of impure speech. As a community under the lordship of Christ, WTCS intends to preserve an environment that is free from sexual harassment.

# Cambodia Presbyterian Church

Westminster Theological College and Seminary Cambodia (WTCS) has a very high view of the church. The mission of WTCS is to teach and train those whom God has called to be pastors and church leaders, and WTCS is committed to equipping these pastors and church leaders with biblical, theological, and ministerial disciplines specifically in the Reformed and Presbyterian tradition.

The WTCS teaching faculty, who have been ordained as teaching elders of the Reformed and Presbyterian denominations, also acknowledge the urgent calling and special responsibility for training and equipping future pastors and leaders so that they can serve the Reformed and Presbyterian churches in Cambodia and beyond.

Cambodia Presbyterian Church (CPC) was organized in June, 2015 with a sole presbytery, having three initiating members (Rev. David Yuhan, Rev. Sang Yong Park, and Rev. Peter Kong), who represented Westminster Presbyterian Church plus seven other local churches. The purpose of organizing CPC is for the new generation of pastors to be examined and ordained following the biblical and reformed tradition, and also for the seminarians of WTCS to be trained and equipped through field education and ministry experiences in the biblical and reformed tradition.

CPC ordained eight pastors: Rev. Pheak Ny and Rev. Atoka Swu on February 16, 2016; Rev. Sarath Sous on March 20, 2017; Rev. Silong Oum, Rev. Sokah Chan, and Rev. Sophal Uk on November 20, 2017; Rev Vuthy Chun on March 18,



2019; Reboer Il Kwon on March 9, 2020, and they are all currently serving local churches or Westminster Seminary Cambodia.

Any church which is firmly based on the biblical principle and on the reformed theology is welcome to join CPC (contact: 017-450-042).



## Board of Trustees

Westminster Theological College and Seminary (WTCS) is governed by Westminster World Mission Foundation (WWMF). WWMF consists of 15 Trustees all of whom have served as faithful ministers or elders in the LORD's church. Each Trustee subscribes to the confessional standards of Westminster Confession of Faith. WWMF was founded in May, 2011 with its initial name of Westminster Education Institute (WEI), as a non-governmental organization, and the Board of Trustees renamed it WWMF on January 26, 2015. Its head office is located in the USA and its office on the spot is in Cambodia.

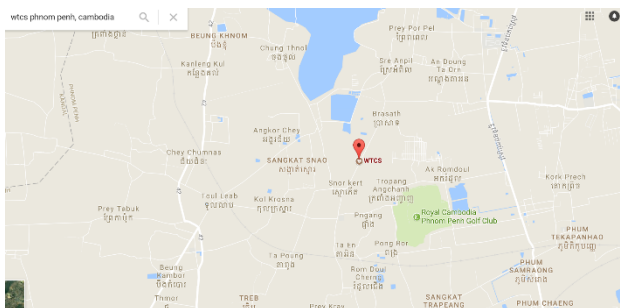
